Good morning students

Students this lesson is for Class III for the subject of English Language in which Chapter 19, Sentences is continued on page number 98 of your textbook titled 'My Grammar Time' and is being submitted to you on 2.12.24

Children, in the previous lesson, we have learnt about sentences. A sentence always has a verb and a subject. The subject of a sentence is a person, place or thing that does or is something. A sentence begins with a capital letter and ends with a full stop, question mark or exclamation mark.

In this lesson, we are going to learn what is a question and how to change the statements into questions.

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Read the following sentences.

Meena is a new girl in class III. Richa wants to be her friend. Let us hear what they are talking about.



Richa

Hello! What is your name?

Hi! I am Meena.



Meena



Richa

Will you be my friend?

Yes, I will.

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The sentences that end with question marks are **questions**. Richa asks Meena a few questions. We also ask questions to know about something.

When we ask questions, we use words like **what, who, where, how** and **which**. These are known as **question words**.

Examples :

- (i) **What** is your name?
- (ii) **Who** are you?
- (iii) **Where** do you stay?
- (iv) **How** do you come to school?
- (v) **Which** colour do you like the most?

★ We always use a question mark at the end of the sentence.

Sometimes, we can form questions by making some changes in sentences.

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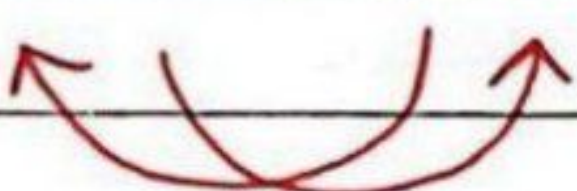
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★ Meena was present in class yesterday.
(a statement)



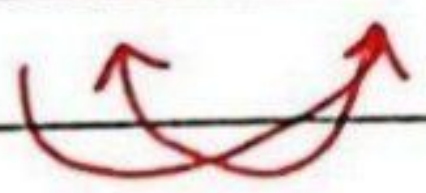
Was Meena present in class yesterday?
(a question)

★ Jyoti will sing. (a statement)



Will Jyoti sing?

★ Mita is late for school.



Is Mita late for school?

★ In a statement, the verb comes after the noun or pronoun. We can change a statement into a question by shifting the verb to the beginning of ^{the} sentence.
