Today let us read and understand the summary of poem in your English reader "ROBINHOOD AND THE WIDOW'S THREE SONS" given on page number 61.

Old though this legend is, it remains as fresh as the green leaves of Sherwood Forest in Nottinghamshire, England, where Robin and his Merry Men are supposed to have made their home in the 15th century. Do enjoy reading.

This ballad, a poem that tells a story through song, describes one of Robin Hood's famous acts of bravery and cleverness, who fights injustice with his band of companions. Robin Hood, a legendary hero known for helping the poor by taking from the wealthy, learns that three squires have been sentenced to death for killing the king's deer. Upon hearing this from a poor widow and an old beggar, Robin decides to intervene.

The poem opens with a description of May as the merriest month of the year, setting a lively tone. However, Robin's encounter with the widow shifts the mood, as he hears of the unjust fate awaiting her sons.
