1. Located in the heart of Beijing, the Gu-Gong Palace in China was a royal administrative site for royal use during the Ming and Qing dynasties in Chinese history.
2. Buckingham Palace was a palace originally established for the Duke of Buckingham in 1703. In 1761, George III used this place as his private residence and it was then known as the "Queen's House."
3. Grand Kremlin palace was built between 1837 to 1851 portrays medieval Russian and Byzantine architecture. Moscow
4. Palace of Versailles was built in the 16th century under Louis XVI. It includes a 70 meter long hall of mirrors and the famous Le Norte French Park. France
5. Situated in Gwalior, the Jai Vilas Palace was built by Maharaja Jayji Rao to welcome the 'Prince of Wales' on his trip to India.
6. Tower of London is a famous and historic palace in England. At this historic place a number of queens were executed and where the crown jewels are located.
7. Situated in Jodhpur, the Umaid Bhavan palace is one of the largest residences of the world.
8. Situated on Lake Pichola, the Lake Palace of Udaipur is one of the finest examples of oriental workmanship.
9. Kew Palace was home to George II. The palace and the cottage of Queen Charlotte are great tourist attractions in London.
10. Topkapi Palace is situated in Istanbul and is now a historic building and also a museum.

Read about some of the mythical places and fill up the blanks using the Help Box.

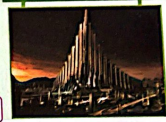

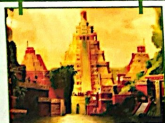
